### Hi everyone,

We have had a lot to celebrate already this term!

At the start of 2023 Wooranna Park Primary School formally began a journey towards becoming a **'School-wide Positive Behaviour Support'** school. School-wide positive behaviour support (SWPBS) is a framework that bring together school communities to build positive, safe and supportive learning cultures. SWPBS has a strong evidence base behind it and is supported by the Department of Education as a <u>'best practice' model</u> for schools to use.


In essence, SWPBS require that the school defines what positive behaviours they expect of their students and then work together to teach those expectations clearly and frequently to students. The expectations are drawn up in a 'Matrix of Expectations' which is highly visible around the school and referred to daily. The school then provides positive recognition of the times in which students are successful in demonstrating these behaviours and provide logical consequences and further support or re-teaching when the expectations are not met. Most of all, it is the clarity that students have about what is expected and what will happen when the behaviours are demonstrated (or not) that give the framework its power.

SWPBS is built on the understanding that behaviour is a learned response to a given stimulus and therefore is something that can be taught and re-taught. When communities do this together consistently it is far easier to make progress in this area.


There is a lot more work to do before we can fully implement the SWPBS framework, however we are well on the way and can see the impact as represented below in some data collected through the Department of Education's Self-Assessment Survey (SAS). This survey is used by school staff for initial and annual assessment of effective behaviour support systems in their school, highlighting that staff feel that we are well on the way in having School-wide Systems and Non-Classroom Setting Systems in place.

#### **Mini Fete**

#### Accident Insurance / Ambulance Cover

This is a reminder that schools do not provide **personal** accident insurance or ambulance cover for students. Parents and carers of students who do not have student accident insurance and/or ambulance cover, are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including the cost of ambulance attendance and any other transport costs.

#### KidsROAR Personal Safety Program

Later in this term we will be engaging our students with <u>KidsROAR</u>, an incursion to ensure our students are empowered about their rights (Child Safe Standard 3).



**'We Are ROARsome' – Prep to Grade 4:** The Primary Years Personal Safety Programs are designed to empower children with simple strategies if faced with an unsafe situation, including potential abuse.

**We Can 'ROAR' Workshop – Grades 5 & 6:** The Grade 5/6 'We Can ROAR' workshop supports students in establishing and maintaining respectful and safe relationships. This two hour interactive program not only includes further education on personal safety, but it also addresses the important concepts of Respect, Consent, Bullying and the Law, Consequences of Choices and Social Media Safety.

We are offering an online parent and carer session in the lead up to the classroom session which I would strongly encourage you to attend on **Tuesday 13 August at 7:30pm**. Please use the link below for your upcoming KidsROAR Parent and Carer Session .

Dear Parents/Carers,

ROAR Australia is committed to the prevention of abuse on children through education on Personal Safety. Our programs are based on Protective Behaviours Themes:

- \* 'We all have the right to feel safe at all times' and
- We can talk to someone we trust about anything, no matter what it is

Every child has the right to feel safe at all times. Each year however, thousands of children across Australia experience abuse. It is estimated that 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 7 boys will be subject to some form of unwanted sexual activity before the age of 18 (Australian Institute of Criminology).

Often parents and teachers focus on the issue of "stranger danger" when teaching personal safety to children. Statistics show that over 90% of children that experience abuse know and trust the perpetrator (Australian institute of Health and Welfare 2000-01).

ROAR Australia programs provide tools and strategies that empower children to help reduce their vulnerability to abuse and unsafe situations. We believe that from an early age, children need to learn that their body is their body and no-one has the right to touch it inappropriately.

#### Our Parent/Carer Information Session

The content covered in our Parent/Carer Information session is not suitable for children as we will share information on sexual abuse, statistics of child sexual abuse, child sex offenders and grooming. This highlights the importance of delivering body safety education to children.

We will also discuss the content covered in the children's personal safety sessions. It is important to note we discuss body safety with the children, not sex education and their right to feel safe at all times. The student program content includes:

- Feelings and emotions
- Know the meaning of consent
- Recognise safe and unsafe feelings
- Early warning signs
- *Udentify* and use correct anatomical names of the private parts of their body
- Safety Network of trusted adults should "tell" if they are feeling worried or unsafe
- Secrets



### In the Grade 1/2 Unit ....



This term we have introduced the concept of goal setting. We brainstormed the purpose of goals and importance of setting and monitoring them. The students and teachers worked together to set these goals by reflecting on their learning from last semester. It has been quite amazing to see students refer to their goals and the pride they feel when they are moving closer to their goals.



In maths, we have explored the topic of multiplication. The students have used counters to make and then draw arrays and groups of. The students have counted and ordered collections of Australian coins and notes according to their value.



### What is a CHAT Encounter Culture Day Camp?


CHAT Camp is a four day program built to encourage and teach us how to have respectful and curious conversations with people different to us.
