'We Are ROARsome' - Prep to Grade 4: The Primary Years Personal Safety Programs are designed to empower children with simple strategies if faced with an unsafe situation, including potential abuse.

We Can 'ROAR' Workshop – Grades 5 & 6: The Grade 5/6 'We Can ROAR' workshop supports students in establishing and maintaining respectful and safe relationships. This two hour interactive program not only includes further education on personal safety, but it also addresses the important concepts of Respect, Consent, Bullying and the Law, Consequences of Choices and Social Media Safety.

School Council

I am pleased to share that all members of our School Council completed their Child Safe Training at our recent July meeting. This training reinforces our shared commitment to providing a safe, supportive and inclusive environment for every child. It ensures our council members are informed about their responsibilities under the Child Safe Standards and are equipped to actively contribute to the ongoing safety and wellbeing of our students.



I want to highlight the critical responsibilities all school staff and relevant professionals have in keeping children safe.

Under Victorian law, all registered teachers, school principals, early childhood educators, youth workers, out-of-school-hours care staff, medical professionals, nurses, police officers, and psychologists are mandatory reporters. This applies across all school settings, government, Catholic, and independent, and includes Department of Education and Training (DET) and non-DET staff.

Mandatory reporters are legally required to report any incident, disclosure, or reasonable suspicion of child abuse or harm, including physical, emotional, sexual abuse, or neglect. These responsibilities apply regardless of when or where the concern arises.

Mandatory reporting is not about making judgments or accusations. It is a vital safeguard that ensures concerns are passed on to the appropriate authorities who are trained to investigate and support families when needed. Our shared goal is to protect the rights, safety, and wellbeing of every child and, wherever possible, to work in respectful partnership with families.

Importantly, failure to report a known or suspected incident of abuse is a criminal offence under the Children, Youth and Families Act 2005 (Vic).

Additionally, **all adults in Victoria**, regardless of their profession, have a legal obligation under the Crimes Act 1958 (Vic) to act if they know or suspect that a child is being sexually abused. This includes the Failure to Disclose and Failure to Protect offences, which apply beyond the scope of mandatory reporting.

Thank you for your commitment to maintaining a safe and supportive environment for every child. If you have any questions about these responsibilities or the <u>reporting</u> <u>process</u>, please do not hesitate to seek support or clarification.

Elements of learning: how students learn

The elements of learning are based on research into how the brain learns:

- 1. Attention and focus learning starts when students are engaged and focused. Teachers create environments that reduce distractions and help students pay attention.
- 2. Knowledge and memory new learning builds on what we already know. Teachers help students remember previous lessons and link them to new ideas.
- Retention and recall practice makes permanent, but only when done correctly. Teachers use strategies like spacing, quizzing, and revisiting key concepts to help students remember more over time.
- 4. Mastery and application students learn best when they can apply knowledge in real-world ways. Teachers ask open-ended questions, problem solving, and peer collaboration to help students apply learning.



Elements of teaching: how teachers teach



Schools are focusing on step-by-step or explicit teaching and apply this approach to help students understand, use and remember what they learn.

This means teachers generally start each lesson by clearly explaining what students will learn and why it matters. They break content into smaller steps and actively check for understanding.

Students then practice what they have learnt using different ways over time. This helps them retain information in the long term and apply it with confidence.

How can families support their children's learning?

Schools are investing in proven strategies that support all learners. As a parent or carer, you can play a key role by asking some questions at home.

10 Questions to ask your child about their learning:	
1	What was a learning goal in class today?
2	Can you explain it to me in your own words?
3	What helped you understand it better?
4	What examples were shared with the class?
5	What's one mistake you fixed today?
6	How did you practice what you learned?
7	How would you explain your learning to others?
8	What did you review or remember from earlier lessons?
9	How do you know if you're getting better at something?
10	What's a question you still have about today's learning?

Literacy

This term, the Grade 1/2's have been learning about procedures. We explored the key features of this text type and had lots of fun reading and writing our own. Some of our favourites included How to Make Fairy Bread, How to Greet a Customer and How to Make a Symmetrical Bug. It's been a wonderful way to combine our reading and writing skills with creativity and hands-on activities!





Maths

In Maths, we're building our knowledge of multiplication, division, and key terms like arrays, repeated addition, times, multiply, and sharing equally. Through the experience of Mini Fete, we are learning about Australian money, location, and graphing. Using our knowledge of addition and skip counting, we're solving real-life problems such as calculating total costs and change. We're also exploring directional and positional language by examining stall locations.

The 1/2 unit has been abuzz with enthusiastic preparations for Assembly and the Mini Fete.

These wonderful, authentic learning opportunities have seen students practising speaking skills, developing organisational skills by planning stalls, creating posters and learning to handle money.









Recently our grade 3 and 4 students have been learning about how food and fibre products are made and their importance in our daily lives.

Students examined how and where different goods are produced in Australia and why those goods are made in certain areas of Australia. They then looked at creating a top-down plan of a vegetable garden for our school.






After students completed their plans they were able to make small scale models from recycled materials of their gardens. Finally students presented and explained their models to the rest of the class.









Grade 1/2 are learning to express simple weather events in Japanese. They have begun with everyday weather expressions such as Sunny, Rainy, Stormy, Windy, Cloudy and Snowy.

Grade 3/4 have been working on their Hiragana reading and writing practice. Hiragana forms the basis for learning to read and write in Japanese and is an essential step in understanding Japanese.





Our Prep students have been learning the names of the four seasons in Japanese and exploring how Japanese people celebrate and experience each season. Students have learnt about cultural events like flower viewing picnics and summer fireworks festivals.





- 7. Select the 'Search' button.
- 8. Find the book you want from the search results and select the book title. This will open the book details.
- 9. Select the '+Add book' button.
- 10. Then return to the 'Dashboard' and click 'Finished'.



MOBILE DEVICES

In line with the Department of Education's Mobile Phone policy, all phones brought to school must be switched off and stored securely in the front Office, during the school day.

A mobile phone is a telephone with access to a cellular (telecommunication) system, with or without a physical connection to a network. For the purpose of this policy, "mobile phone" refers to mobile phones and any device that may connect to or have a similar functionality to a mobile phone such as a smartwatch.

When a student is not complying with this mobile phone policy, we will be required to follow a process in accordance with our existing student engagement polices.

SAFETY

All bike and scooter riders are required to wear a bike helmet in Victoria.

Approved helmets have the Australian Standards Mark TM (AS/NZS 2063) and will be marked as suitable for cycling.

Children under the age of 12 may ride on footpaths, as can a supervising adult. They are required to give way to pedestrians and to wheel their bicycles over pedestrian and children's crossings.

For Term One and Four, we wear our named, broad brimmed, navy blue hat at all times when outside.

PROTECT

Everyone has the right to be safe and be protected from abuse.

No one should behave in a way that makes you feel unsafe or afraid, including anyone in your family, anyone at school or anywhere else in the community.

Tell a teacher or any adult at your school if you feel unsafe.





It's everyone's responsibility.

Adults at school must listen and respond to concerns about child abuse.

If you suspect abuse of any child or young person, you have a responsibility to report it, even if you are not sure.






HOLIDAY PROGRAM IMPORTANT INFO



During our venue days, you are welcome to drop off your child at anytime throughout our opening hours. This Vacation Care all three venues will be open from 7 am until 5 pm. If there are any special events on during a venue day, these will be communicated with you via email prior to the day. EXCURSION DAYS

CHANGES

REFUNDS

CHILDCARE SUBSIDY



Before attending our Vacation Care program you will need to ensure you have your CCS active through Centrelink. If you attend without CCS, you will be required to pay full fees for your bookings with DS Sports. If you have any questions please reach out to our admin team. For more information regarding CCS please go to Centrelink online to apply for the Childcare Subsidy.

WHAT TO WEAR?
